Workshop I:

Exploring the Schizoid / Schizotypal Psyche Through Dreams

Dr. Hendrika Vande Kemp, Ph. D.



Dr. Vande Kemp is a licensed clinical psychologist and an AAMFT-approved family therapy supervisor. She served on the faculty of the Graduate School of Psychology at Fuller Theological Seminary for 25 years, teaching courses and seminars on: Marital and Family Therapy, Family Psychology, Interpersonal Psychotherapy, Dreams in Psychotherapy, Spirituality and Dreams, Psychological and Theological Issues in Disability, Death, Dying, and Grief, and a variety of integration seminars. She is a fellow of the APA, and the author of various articles and book chapters on theoretical and philosophical psychology, clinical psychology, and psycho-theological integration.

The DSM-IV, with its emphasis on observable behavior, provides the clinician with few tools for observing the severe psychic pain that is the clinical hallmark of the schizoid/schizotypal disorders as they are understood by such superb psychodynamic clinicians as Harry Guntrip, Frank Lake, Peter Giovacchini, Christopher Bollas, and R. D. Laing. The session will focus on a dream sequence of one client, diagnosed first as a Schizoid Personality Disorder and later as a Schizotypal Personality Disorder, to illustrate failure of repression, depersonalization (of ego) and derealization (of the world), dissociation, loss of boundaries, the dehydrated inner life, the fear of petrification, existential guilt, primitive sexuality, the unembodied self, the manifestation of a Doppelganger, oral aggression, fears of implosion and engulfment, occult themes, detachment, and the drastic schizoid split.

Workshop Objectives:

1. Introduce the psychodynamic theory relevant to Schizoid / Schizotypal Disorder
2. Describe many of the mental symptoms of this disorder, especially as found in dreams
3. Identify useful clinical interventions when dealing with a Schizoid / Schizotypal patient.

Workshop II:

Treating the Personality Disorder Patient

Dr. Rudolph Calabrese, Ph. D.



Dr. Calabrese has extensive clinical and supervisory experience, and is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker in VA, NY, and FL. He is a certified psychoanalytic therapist. He is on the faculty at Iona College, the Washington School of Psychiatry, and the Center for Modern Psychoanalysis. His publications include *The Paranoid Process: Theory and Treatment*.

The workshop will be focused on a complex borderline personality disorder patient with significant narcissistic components. Both transference and counter transference will be given special emphasis. In addition, the patient's bodily expression of sexual symptoms will be analyzed.

Workshop Objectives:

1. Dealing with complex transference / counter transference.
2. Interpreting perverse sexual symptoms.
